COME, LET US ADORE HIM!

WHY ADORATION?

Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament is a gift that has offered countless souls over the centuries—in both private and communal settings and regardless of culture, class, rank, or esteem—intimacy and companionship, comfort and security, assurance and peace. Jesus Christ is present to us in a unique and tangible way; he is accessible and available to adore.

At Mass we are transported to the upper room of Holy Thursday and to the foot of the cross on Good Friday. Christ's once-and-for-all sacrifice is made present. At Mass we consume and are consumed by the Lord's grace.

In Adoration we are afforded a different opportunity for intimacy. We can dwell in his holy presence as he enters ours. We gaze upon him as he gazes back at us. We "draw near to God," as St. James recommended, and have tangible evidence that he draws near to us (James 4:8).

While there is no form of prayer higher or greater than the Mass, Adoration offers us something a little different. The opportunity to just "sit with" the Lord, outside of the liturgy, is a chance like no other on the planet. God is available to us—fully present—in an alternative way.

In fact, the Church is so adamant that we do not "miss" this gift that she alerts us to God's unique Eucharistic presence in every chapel in every corner of the world by a visual reminder. The Eucharist (the consecrated host) is reserved in the tabernacle, which is Latin for "dwelling place" or, more specifically, "tent." Beside every tabernacle in the world burns a candle, most often encased in red. When one candle burns out, it is replaced with another. Thus a light offers an enduring reminder of Christ's perpetual presence not only among us— for he is Emmanuel, which means "God is with us" (Matthew 1:23)—but, even more specifically, in the sanctuary or chapel.

What I find amazing is that the eternal flame was not a Catholic idea. This is a tradition that hearkens all the way back to

the time of Moses. The Book of Exodus tells us of God's prescription of a flame as a reminder of his dwelling among his people as they ventured into (and wandered in) the desert following their enslavement and escape from Egypt. You see, God's presence was in and with the ark of the covenant, which held the Ten Commandments, a pot of manna, and the priestly staff of Moses' brother, Aaron (see Hebrews 9:3-4). Since the ark "contained" the presence of God, his people placed it in a special tent (or tabernacle) that was flanked on all sides by God's priests. As a reminder to his people that he was indeed with them and would not abanthem. prescribed don God the following: And you shall command the sons of Israel that they bring to you pure beaten olive oil for the light, that a lamp may be set up to burn continually. In the tent of meeting, outside the veil . . ., Aaron and his sons shall tend it from evening to morning before the Lord. It shall be a statute for ever to be observed throughout their generations by the sons of Israel. (Exodus 27:20-21, RSVCE)

Isn't that amazing? God "dreamt up," well over three thousand years ago, that little red candle that alerts us to Christ's true presence in our churches. Which begs the question, why did God feel it would be necessary to remind his people of his presence? Quite simply, because he knows people better than we know ourselves, and he must have known they would need reminding! Life gets busy. Sin distracts us. We are fallen and human and oftentimes self-focused. God loves us enough to call us out of ourselves and put a constant reminder, burning in our parishes, that we might seek and invite the Lord to burn (again) in our hearts! Give the Holy Spirit permission to open the eyes of your heart to the great gift of adoring the Eucharist. Ask him to reveal himself and his love in a new way while you are in his sacred presence.

FEBRUARY DAYTIME WARMING CENTER



DRIVE SAFE BILLS RESTORE HUMAN DIGNITYby allowing driver's licenses for ALL MI residents!

Imagine your driver's license is taken away tomorrow because of a change of law. How would you get to work, get your kids to school, or buy groceries? This is exactly what happened to thousands of undocumented immigrants in Michigan since 2008.

Since then, many of these community residents were stopped by police for minor traffic violations, and lacking a driver's license, placed in detention with the possibility of deportation, with devastating effects on families! These are the same 1000's of folks in our state whose often low-paying essential jobs keep our businesses going.

Drive SAFE (Safety, Access, Freedom, and the Economy) bills, if passed, would make driver's licenses and state ID's available to all MI residents, regardless of immigration status, which 18 other states already allow. No federal privileges or right to vote, just to drive legally!

Michigan Catholic Conference, and 60+ other organizations led by **Drive MI Forward,** a statewide, multi-organizational, interfaith, and immigrant-led coalition, strongly support the Drive SAFE bills. MCC supports them as a matter of compassion, human dignity and safety. MI public policy experts estimate that the bills would generate increased state revenues due to all the new drivers. Plus, our roads would be safer by ensuring that the new drivers are tested and insured.
