DECISIONS GREAT AND SMALL

I write this having just returned from this year's Grad/YP retreat. We had 29 members of the Grad/YP group at the Weber Center in Adrian, led by Fr. Trevor Rainwater, SJ, a newly ordained priest on faculty at U of D Jesuit High School in Detroit. On Sunday morning, Trevor had the group reflecting on significant decisions of their lives, perhaps decisions made in

the past, or perhaps decisions they are facing now. That got me to reflect on some of my own decisions, some of which brought me to the Society of Jesus and ordination, some to an academic career in Mathematics Education, and some that finally led me here to St. Mary Student Parish. I've had the pleasure of serving here for seven years now, even though my earlier "academic self" never imagined that I might be assigned to (or even enjoy!) parish work. It has become clear in my life that God's imagination is much greater than my own, as God keeps sending new opportunities my way just when I thought that there was nothing new under the sun.

And so it happened again when I received a phone call from my Provincial Superior last summer asking me if I would be interested in taking a new job. In itself, this was not a surprise. After seven years in an assignment like this, it is not at all unusual for us to be asked to move on. What was a surprise, however, was the offer to consider becoming the Chaplain to the Loyola University Rome Center campus. Yes. In Rome. The one in Italy! Talk about things that I never imagined doing!

It took some time, honestly, to adjust to this new possibility that both excited and terrified me. I have never lived outside the country for more than a few weeks at time, and Italian has never been on my list of languages to learn. And yet ... the Spirit has a way of working, of conquering fears, and of opening possibilities where none before existed. And so in late January, after visiting the campus in Rome for a few days—and being extravagantly welcomed and encouraged by the staff and students there—I told my provincial that I would be happy to take the job.

As excited as I am to begin, leaving here will by no means be easy. I have enjoyed my years here at the parish, becoming deeply fond of so many of you—students, Grad/YPs, resident parishioners—that making this moving will be bittersweet. No need to start with the goodbyes just yet, though. My departure date will likely be sometime in late May or early June. I still have a final RCIA group to welcome into the Church this Easter!

When I look at all those on the Grad/YP retreat, I see them facing so many big decisions about grad school, about career paths, about relationships and marriage. But as unique as that time of life may be, the big decisions keep coming throughout our lives, even if we can fall into the slump of thinking that there is nothing new under the son. Jesus told us that God's ways are not our ways, and I have repeatedly learned what a wondrous gift that is. Because God's imagination is much greater than our own, and that means our lives never lose the possibility of being filled with surprises.

LEARNING THE EFFECTS OF SYSTEMIC RACISM

This is part of a series presented by the St. Mary Anti-Racism Working Group - a group of parishioners that works to help build what Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. called the "Beloved Community". As Pope Francis said, "we cannot tolerate or turn a blind eye to racism and exclusion in any form and yet claim to defend the sacredness of every human life". In this column, we explain what the term "systemic" racism means and provide links to videos that may help members of our parish better understand this concept.

So, what is systemic racism? Cambridge dictionary online defines systemic racism as: "policies and practices that exist throughout a whole society or organization, and that result in and support a continued unfair advantage to some people and unfair or harmful treatment of others based on race." In other words, it is the systems within society that perpetuate inequities for racial minorities.

One key aspect of systemic racism is that these mechanisms operate independently of any individual's intentions or actions, so even if personal racism is not present, these unfavorable conditions and inequalities for racial minorities continue to exist. Some examples of systems that often perpetuate structural racism include the criminal justice system, education, healthcare,


banking and housing systems in the United States.

This second video shorturl.at/vRSV1 "Racism in the United States: By the Numbers", gives many concrete examples of ways in which systemic racism affects Black Americans.

While the issue of racism may seem like a secular issue, it is an affront to the dignity of people of color. Catholic Social Teaching makes it clear that the life and human dignity of the person should be the foundation for our moral decision making. The Anti-Racism Working Group invites you to become a part of our efforts to transform ourselves and our parish through education, action and accompaniment. This month we welcome three married couples within our parish who will speak on their personal experience of living their faith as a married couple across the years.



DRIVE SAFE BILLS RESTORE HUMAN DIGNITY

....by allowing driver's licenses for ALL MI residents!

Imagine your driver's license is taken away tomorrow because of a change of law. How would you get to work, get your kids to school, or buy groceries? This is exactly what happened to thousands of undocumented immigrants in Michigan since 2008.

Since then, many of these community residents were stopped by police for minor traffic violations, and lacking a driver's license, placed in detention with the possibility of deportation, with devastating effects on families! These are the same 1000's of folks in our state whose often low-paying essential jobs keep our businesses going.

Drive SAFE (Safety, Access, Freedom, and the Economy) bills, if passed, would make driver's licenses and state ID's available to all MI residents, regardless of immigration status, which 18 other states already allow. No federal privileges or right to vote, just to drive legally!

Michigan Catholic Conference, and 60+ other organizations led by **Drive MI Forward**, a statewide, multi-organizational, interfaith, and immigrant-led coalition, strongly support the Drive SAFE bills. MCC supports them as a matter of compassion, human dignity and safety. MI public policy experts estimate that the bills would generate increased state revenues due to all the new drivers. Plus, our roads would be safer by ensuring that the new drivers are tested and insured.
